President Samuel S. Olens



Past Presidents - KSU

Horace W. Sturgis, 1965 - 1980 Betty L. Siegel, Ph.D., 1981 - 2006 Daniel S. Papp, Ph.D., 2006 - 2016 Olens was elected Georgia's 53rd attorney general in 2010 and re-elected in 2014. In his role, Olens worked with the governor and legislature to strengthen the penalties for sex trafficking and protect the victims. He also guided a comprehensive revision of Georgia's sunshine laws and led the effort to stem the epidemic of prescription drug abuse. Additionally, in cooperation with the Georgia Food Bank Association and Young Lawyers Division of the State Bar of Georgia, Olens established the Georgia Legal Food Frenzy, which has collected the equivalent of over 5 million pounds of food for Georgia's youth.

Prior to being elected attorney general, Olens was chairman of the Cobb County Board of Commissioners, serving from August 2002 through March 2010. He previously served as a county commissioner from 1999 through June 2002. He also served as chair of the Atlanta Regional Commission from December 2004 through 2009, and as vice-chair of the Metropolitan North Georgia Water District from 2005 through March 2010.

Olens is the recipient of numerous awards and honors for leadership and service. In 2016, Georgia Trend magazine named him the Georgian of the Year, and he has been listed among the publication's "100 Most Influential Georgians" for 13 consecutive years. That same year, Olens was presented with the Silver Beaver Award, which is the highest honor a local Boy Scout Council can present to a volunteer. In 2015, Olens received the Charles L. Weltner Freedom of Information Award, and in 2013, he received the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Emory University School of Law. Additionally, in 2011, the Cobb Chamber of Commerce honored Olens for his dedication to community and philanthropic service by naming its annual community service award the "Sam Olens Business Community Service Award."

He recently served as vice president of the National Association of Attorneys General, having previously served as chair of the 13-state Southern Region both in 2013 and 2015. Olens is a registered mediator/arbitrator with the Georgia Office of Dispute Resolution and has been admitted to practice law in Georgia and the District of Columbia.

Olens received his juris doctorate from Emory University School of Law, and holds a bachelor's and master's degree from American University in international politics.

He and his wife Lisa have two children, Lauren and Jonathan.


- The university was recognized for its leadership in the area of diversity. <u>Diverse: Issues In Higher Education</u> magazine ranked the University among the top 100 colleges and universities in the nation, and <u>INSIGHT Into Diversity</u> magazine designated KSU a "Diversity Champion," for the second consecutive year one of only 12 schools nationwide to be honored for 2017.
- The International Association of Venue Managers awarded KSU's Sports and Entertainment Park with the Education & Service Award.
- Kennesaw State launched an Analytics and Data Science Institute to facilitate and support advanced study and research in the area of data science and advanced analytics. The new Institute, which houses the university's Ph.D. in Analytics and Data Science, includes multiple research labs in collaboration with partners like Equifax and GE Power.
- Longtime university donors Tommy and Chantal Bagwell contributed \$2.25 million towards the launch of the Bagwell Center for the Study of Markets and Economic Opportunity, housed in the Michael J. Coles College of Business.
- Milton Overton was named the university's director of athletics. Overton, a 25-year veteran of college athletics administration, has spent the last two years as director of athletics at Florida A&M University.
- For the seventh consecutive year, KSU was among a select group of universities to score an "A" for its high-quality core curriculum in a nationwide study by the American Council of Trustees and Alumni.
- The Department of Political Science and International Affairs was elevated to the School of Government and International Affairs.
- The Executive MBA in the Michael J. Coles College of Business was recognized by <u>CEO Magazine</u> among the top 10 programs in the world.
- Brian Bohannon, who guided Kennesaw State to a Big South Conference championship, the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division I FCS Playoffs, and a No. 8 final ranking in the STATS FCS Poll, was named the 2017 AFCA FCS Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).
- The Coca-Cola Foundation donated \$1.25 million for the Coca-Cola First Generation and Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Scholars program, which will provide scholarships and wraparound services to 35 students.
- Graduates from Kennesaw State University's WellStar School of Nursing are earning their professional certifications at a higher rate than the national average. In 2017, 97% of KSU's Bachelor of Science in Nursing graduates passed the National Council Licensure Examination on their first attempt, the nationwide average is 87%.




Figure 1. Applicants - Applied, Accepted, Enrolled Freshmen by Gender








Figure 5. Enrollment by College




Figure 6. Enrollment Trend by Gender

Figure 7. Race and Ethnicity Trend by Fall Semesters






Figure 10. International Student Enrollment




Figure 11. Enrollment by College and Degree Level




Figure 12. Primary Majors by College - Academic Affairs




Figure 13. Primary Majors by College - College of Architecture and Construction Management




Figure 14. Primary Majors by College - College of the Arts






Figure 16. Primary Majors by College - College of Computing and Software Engineering






Figure 24. Primary Majors by College - Other/Non-Degree Seeking




Figure 31. Southern Polytechnic College of Engineering and Engineering Technology





Historic Institutional Retention and Graduation Rates




Figure 37. Historic Institutional Retention and Graduation Rates

Retained: Students are considered retained only if they are bachelor's degree seeking and have not yet obtained a bachelor's degree. Students are retained if they have received an associate's degree and if they continue in a bachelor's degree program. Students are not removed from the original cohort or retention numbers based on deceased status. Student retention is not based on full-time/part-time status. Prior to Fall 2015, a student is retained only if they are enrolled in the institution in which they started.

Continued: Students are considered continued if they are enrolled in a fall semester beyond their fourth year at an institution. The continuing student rate is calculated using the same method as retention rate (it is essentially the retention rate after four years). Continuing students are identified differently from students retained after their first, second, and third years at the institution due to the goal for continuing students shifting from retaining to graduating them. Graduated: Students are considered graduated only if they graduate with a bachelor's degree. Graduation rates are cumulative. For example, a student within the 2010 cohort is considered graduated if they have graduated with a bachelor's degree on or before Summer 2016. Graduation rate refers only to the proportion of the cohort which received a bachelor's degree and not the actual number of degrees which have been awarded to those in the cohort.




Figure 38. Percent of Credit Hours Taught by Full-Time and Part-Time Faculty




Figure 39. New Full-Time Instructional Faculty



Academic tenure is an employment status at the University that assures a tenured faculty member of continuous appointment from contract year to contract year, except under conditions of dismissal for cause (see KSU Faculty Handbook Section 4.1.9), termination or layoff of tenured personnel due to program modification (see the Board of Regents (BOR) Policy Manual 8.3.7.10), or financial exigencies. The awarding of tenure is a highly important decision through which the University incurs a major commitment to the individual faculty member well into the future. Years of service or successful annual reviews alone are not sufficient to qualify for tenure. It should only be granted to those faculty members whose achievements demonstrate the quality and significance expected of their current rank and who demonstrate potential for long-term effectiveness at the University. All tenure track faculty are expected to produce scholarship in at least one performance area. This scholarship must be consistent with departmental, college, and university guidelines. Only under exceptional circumstances will a candidate be recommended for tenure without at least one form of scholarship as articulated in approved tenure and promotion guidelines. In awarding tenure, the University recognizes the long-range value of the faculty member to the institution and ensures them the academic freedom that is essential to an atmosphere conducive to the proper operation of the University.

Last Five Fiscal Years




Figure 41. Charitable Giving
